



## **Workshop Program**

for the International Workshop on "Dealing with the aftermath of slave trade and slavery."

A contribution to overcome the toxic legacy of history and to find inspiration for today's fight against slavery.

Elmina (Ghana) 10 - 17 September 2024

Slavery and slave trade marked and impacted human history and reality intensively. The trans-Atlantic slave trade especially had a huge impact on Africa, the Americas and Europe. The wounds provided by this history contributed greatly in shaping the African-European as well as the African-American relationship. Visiting the contemporary relevance of this history vis a vis the toxic impact on today's realities is a challenge to us all. As long as we do not develop a constructive way of dealing with this history, we will not overcome its toxic legacy. The more as we can see a clear connection between lack of shared memory and the weak answer to contemporary slavery.

While some African countries, such as Ghana, have made efforts to address this history, their attempts have not directly focused on overcoming the toxic legacy. They have not sufficiently engaged in reshaping the African-European and African-American relationships. Against the background of the ongoing debates on dealing with colonial legacy, slavery, slave trade and its impact on today's reality have to be addressed. Unfortunately, there is a notable absence of a cross-continental exchange on these issues, which leads to a limited scope of the reflections and as an effect also the responses. Therefore, the Justice and Peace Commission of Ghana and Germany invites 45 participants from the above-mentioned contexts to meet in the former slave fortress Elmina castle in Ghana for an international workshop on dealing with the aftermath of slave trade and slavery in order to exchange experiences, perspectives and reflect on reconciliatory and dialogue possibilities on the subject.

In doing so, the project intends to show respect to the memory of the victims of this violence, deepen our understanding of historical events and their legacy, and draw lessons applicable to today's challenges in combating contemporary slavery. We seek to strengthen and rebuild our communities both as church and humanity as we strengthen our responsibilities in dealing with this legacy.

Beside academic reflection it is of utmost importance to us to address the topics in a multiperspective approach bringing together perspectives and experiences from different parts of Africa, Europe and America. This will be expressed in particular by the symbolically highly





significant Concrete Action in Gross-Friedrichsburg, where the participants will do some concrete maintenance work in the Memorial.

Doing that we like to contribute to a culture of dialogue and to overcome the divisions provided by violent history. As church actors it is also important for us to reflect on the role of the churches in this history. It is a major precondition for credible witnessing against slavery today.
